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Les services du Deputy Under Secretary of Defense for Industrial Policy, William C. Greenwalt, ont demandé à la fondation californienne RandCorp. de rédiger un rapport sur l'impact potentiel des fonds souverains sur le secteur de la défense américaine. Aucun fonds souverains n'a pour le moment investi dans le capital des sous-traitants du Pentagone, mais Mubadala Development Fund d'Abou Dhabi a acquis des participations dans le fonds d'investissement Carlyle, qui investit dans les secteurs de la défense et du renseignement (Carlyle a racheté au printemps les activités de conseil au gouvernement du cabinet Booz Allen - IOL n°571). La China Investment Corp. a, pour sa part, pris des participations dans le fonds américain Blackstone Group. Rand Corp. doit rendre son étude au Pentagone au début de l'année prochaine.
